What is Peer Support?


Builds and nurtures relationships between peers.

Peer Support in Maryland

Maryland is one of a few states in the U.S. that offer problem gambling peer support for individuals and family members. The peer recovery profession is rapidly growing, expanding the communities served.

In Maryland, there are many types of peer recovery supports, including support for problem gambling.





Peer Support for Problem Gambling /Disordered Gambling

In FY2017, Maryland Department of Health's Behavioral Health Administration (BHA) funded the Center to develop Peer Support for problem gambling to individuals.

The Center's Peers work closely with Maryland Coalition of Families (MCF), also funded by BHA to provide peer support to families struggling with problem gambling.

The Center's Peers collaborate with key strategic partners, such as the Maryland Council on Problem Gambling (MCPG).

Insights of Peer Support in the Western Region

Allegany, Frederick, Garrett and Washington Counties

- ✓ 20% of Western Region residents over age 18 are frequent gamblers. (Tracy et al., 2017)
 - ✓ In FY20 (July 2019-June 2020), due to expanded outreach in this region, help seeker calls into the Maryland Helpline were recorded in every county including Garrett County which had not recorded a help seeker call since June 2014. (LACG)
- ✓ 28% of Garrett County 12th graders reported gambling in the last year, the second highest in the state. (YRBS, 2018)





Insights of Peer Support in the Central Region

Baltimore, Carroll, Cecil, Harford and Howard Counties

- √ 19% of residents 18 and older in the Central region gamble frequently (weekly). (Tracy et al., 2017)
- ✓ In FY20 (July 2019-June 2020), help seeker calls into the Maryland Helpline from Baltimore County represented 59% of total calls received from this region. (LACG)
- ✓ 24% of Baltimore County high school students reported gambling in the last year, the third highest in the state. (YRBS, 2018)





Insights of Peer Support in the Southern Region

- ✓ 3% of Southern Region residents over age 18 are disordered gamblers. (Tracy et al., 2017)
 - ✓ In FY20 (July 2019-June 2020), help seeker calls into the Maryland Helpline from this region represented 29% of total calls received across the state; of that number, 40% were from Prince George's County. (LACG)
- ✓ 26% of Prince George's County high school students reported gambling in the last year, the second highest in the state. (YRBS, 2018)

- ✓ Baltimore City has the second highest number of lottery retailers per population at 110 per 100,000 population. (Maryland Lottery and Gaming Control Agency Annual Financial Report, 2019)
- ✓ In FY20 (July 2019-June 2020), help seeker calls into the Maryland Helpline from Baltimore City represented the highest percentage (13%) of calls received in a single jurisdiction. (LACG)
- √ 40% of male high school students in Baltimore City reported gambling in the last year,
 the highest percentage in the state. (YRBS, 2018)



- ✓ Worcester County has the highest number of lottery retailers in the state at 187 per 100,000 population. (Maryland Lottery and Gaming Control Agency Annual Financial Report, 2019)
- ✓ In FY20 (July 2019-June 2020), help seeker calls into the Maryland Helpline from this region increased 3% over the prior year. (LACG)
- ✓ 3% of Eastern Shore Residents are disordered gamblers. (Tracy et al., 2017)
