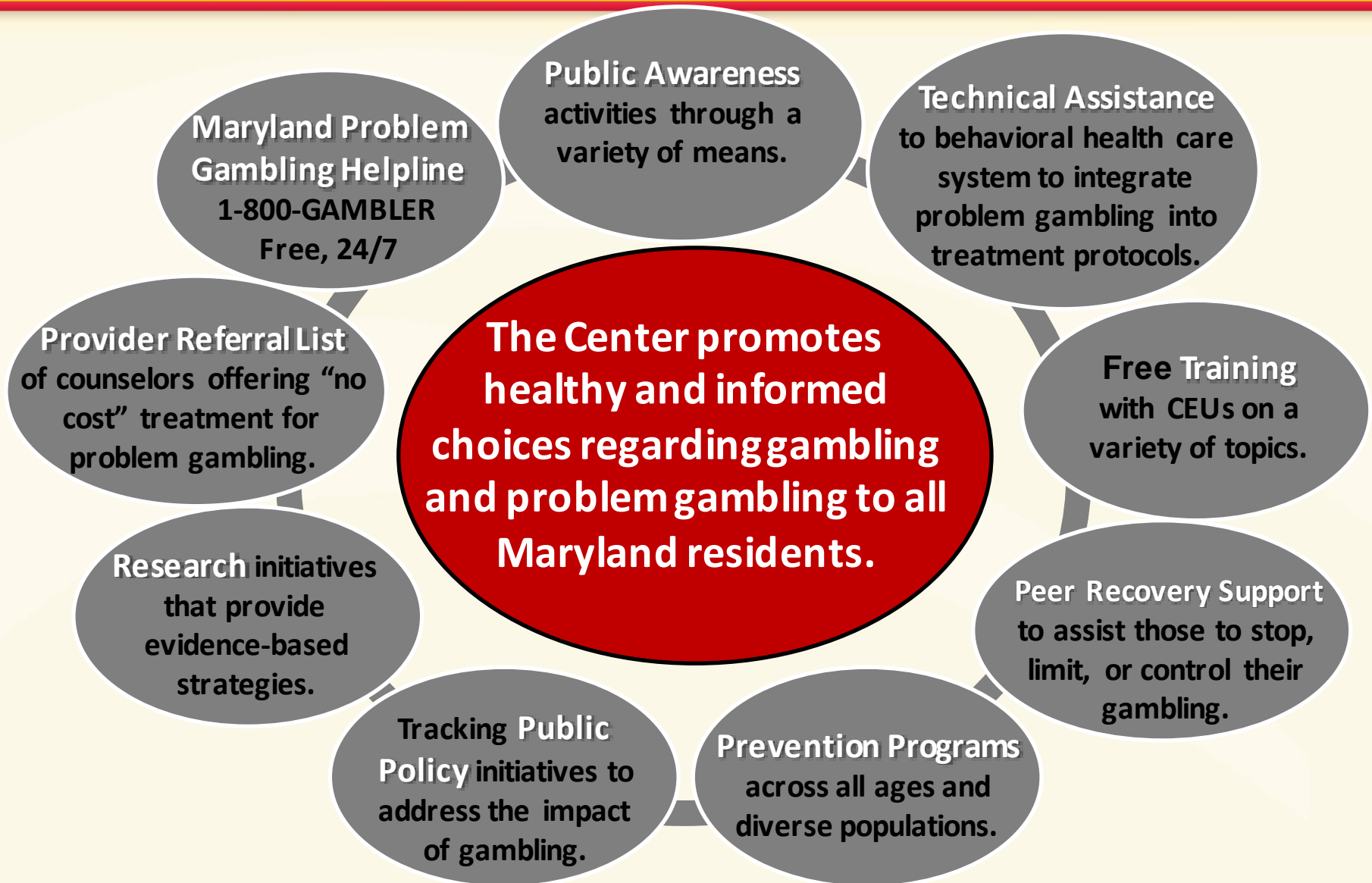

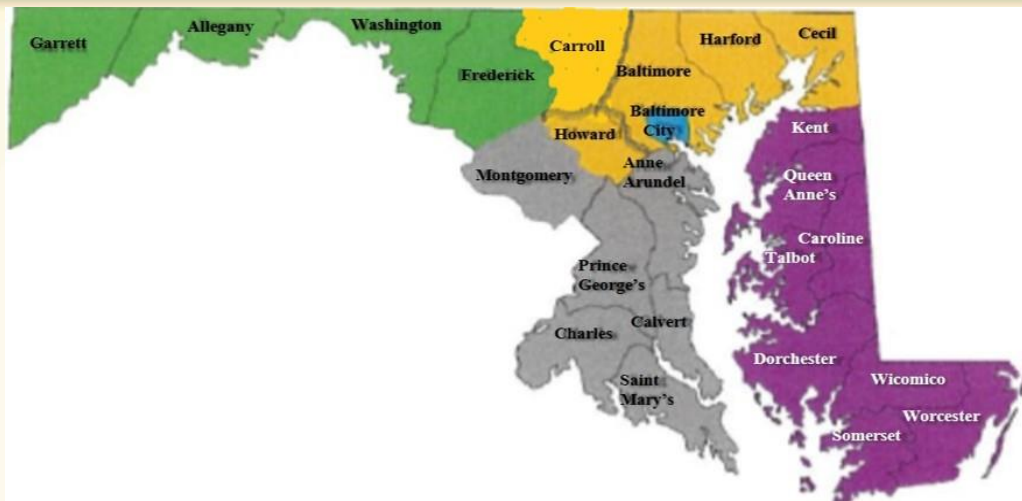

REGIONAL DATA HIGHLIGHTS:

- ✓ Worcester County has the highest number of lottery retailers in the state at 187 per 100,000 population. (Maryland Lottery and Gaming Control Agency Annual Financial Report, 2019)
- ✓ In FY20 (July 2019-June 2020), help seeker calls into the Maryland Helpline from this region increased 3% over the prior year. (LACG)
- ✓ 3% of Eastern Shore Residents are disordered gamblers. (Tracy et al., 2017)

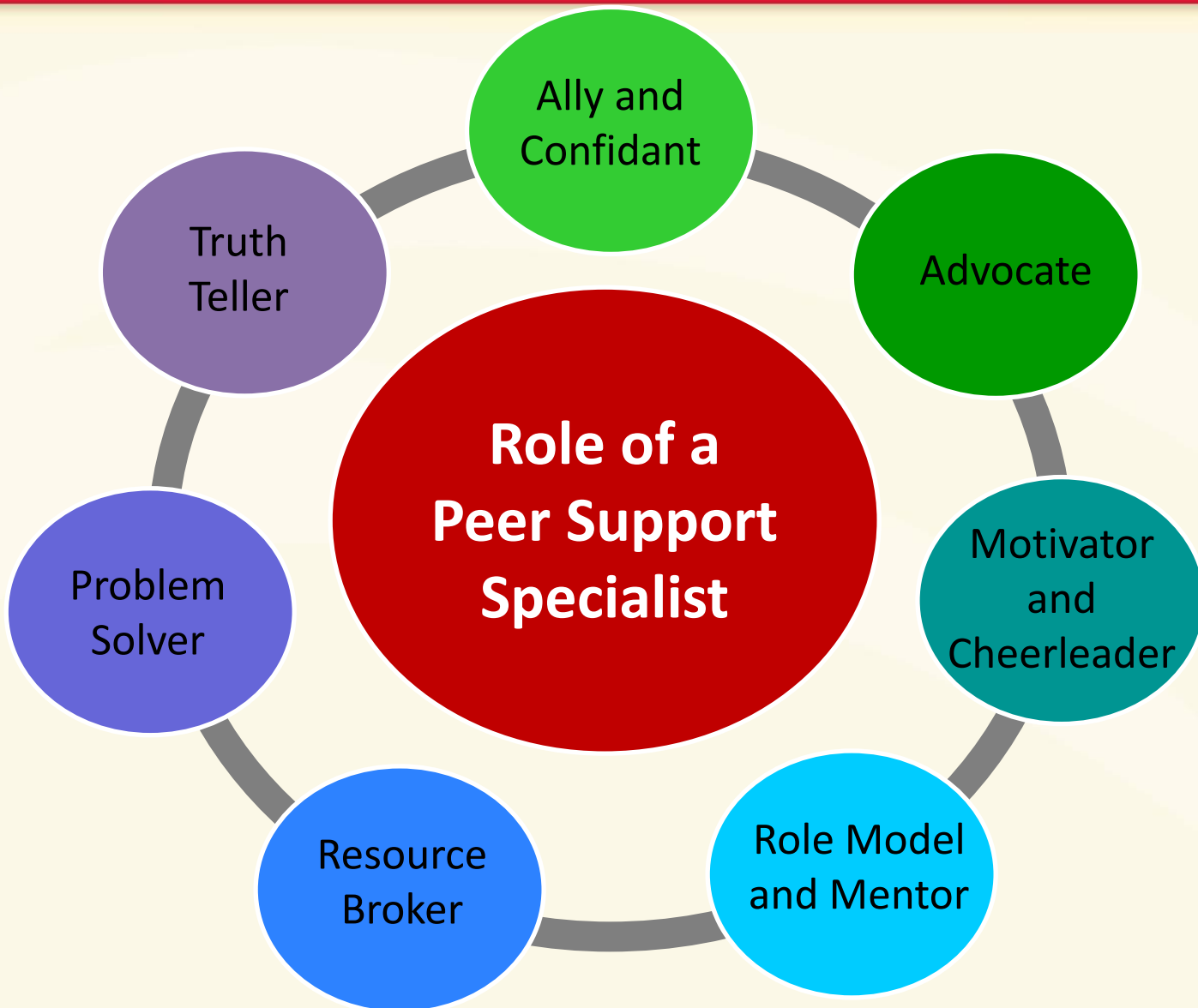

Asian Culture & Gambling

Asian cultures often do not recognize gambling as a behavioral addiction.

Justify the practice of gambling for many reasons

Cultural belief/superstition - playing cards or other gambling methods when feeling lucky.

View gambling as a social activity

Why is gambling a problem?

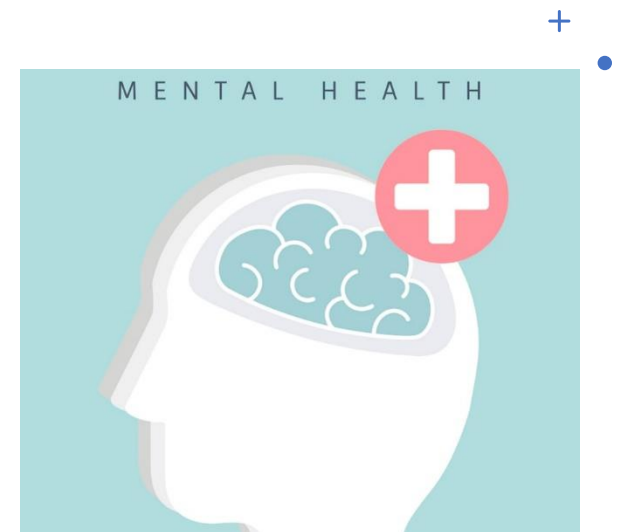
Many Asians with gambling addictions are unwilling to get the support they need.

- Gambling addiction has extreme stigma in Asian cultures.
- Common belief that can stop whenever – leading to lower help seeking.
- Shame is also a huge barrier to seeking help for gambling addiction.
- Gambling problems for parents or families are widely overlooked and have devastating consequences on their children.

Education Programs

My Life Foundation offers evidence-based education programs to Asian Americans residing in Maryland to promote and improve health and well-being.

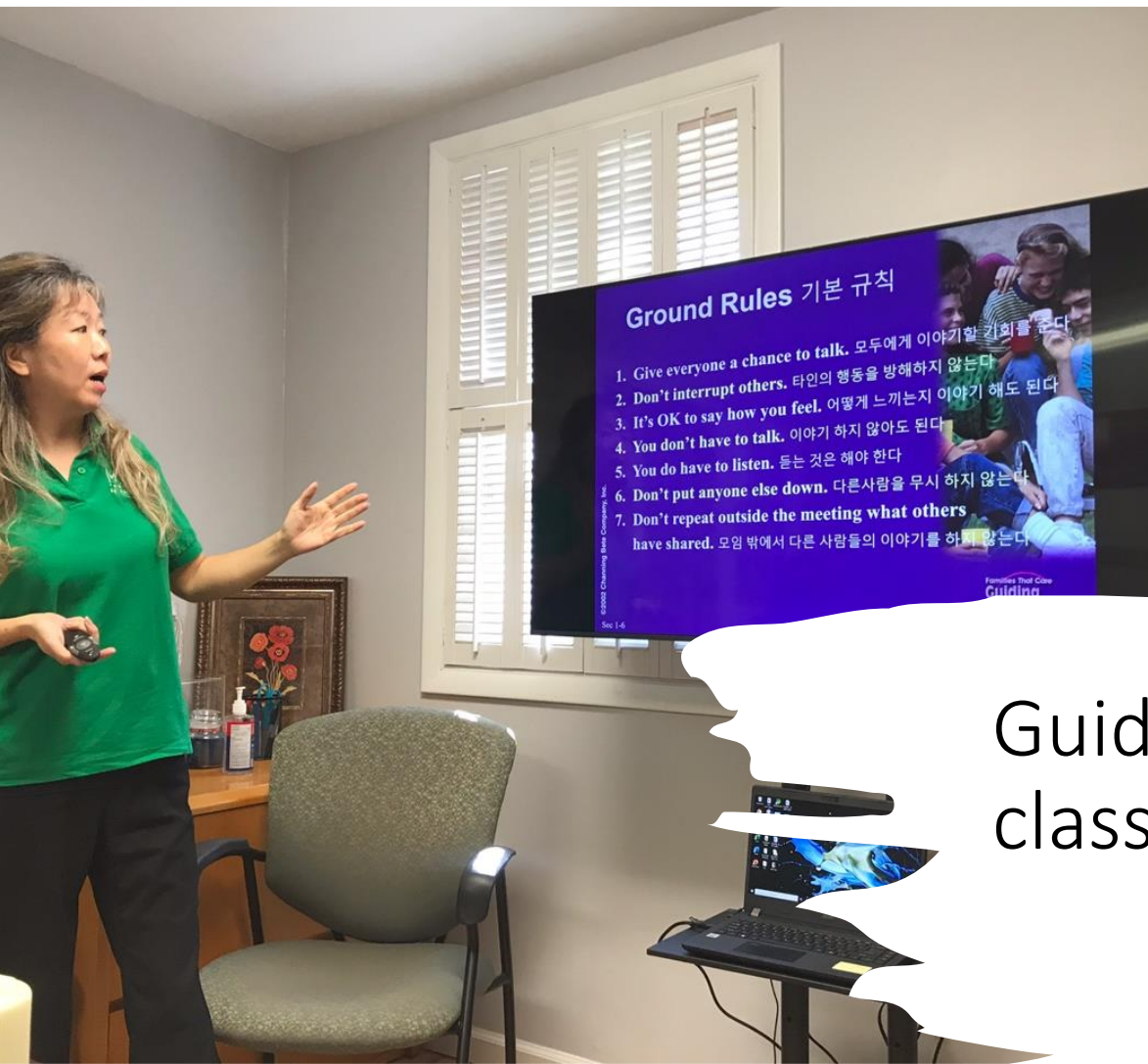

- Advocacy and community capacity building skills
- Effective oral and written communication skills
- Cultural competency
- Understanding of ethics and confidentiality issues
- Knowledge of local resources and system navigation
- Care coordination support skills
- Teaching skills to promote health behavior changes
- Outreach methods and strategies
- Understanding of public health concepts and health literacy

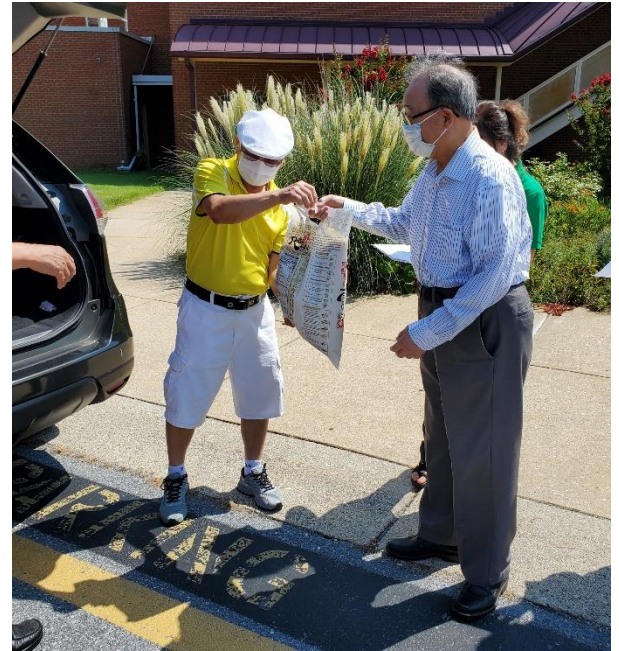

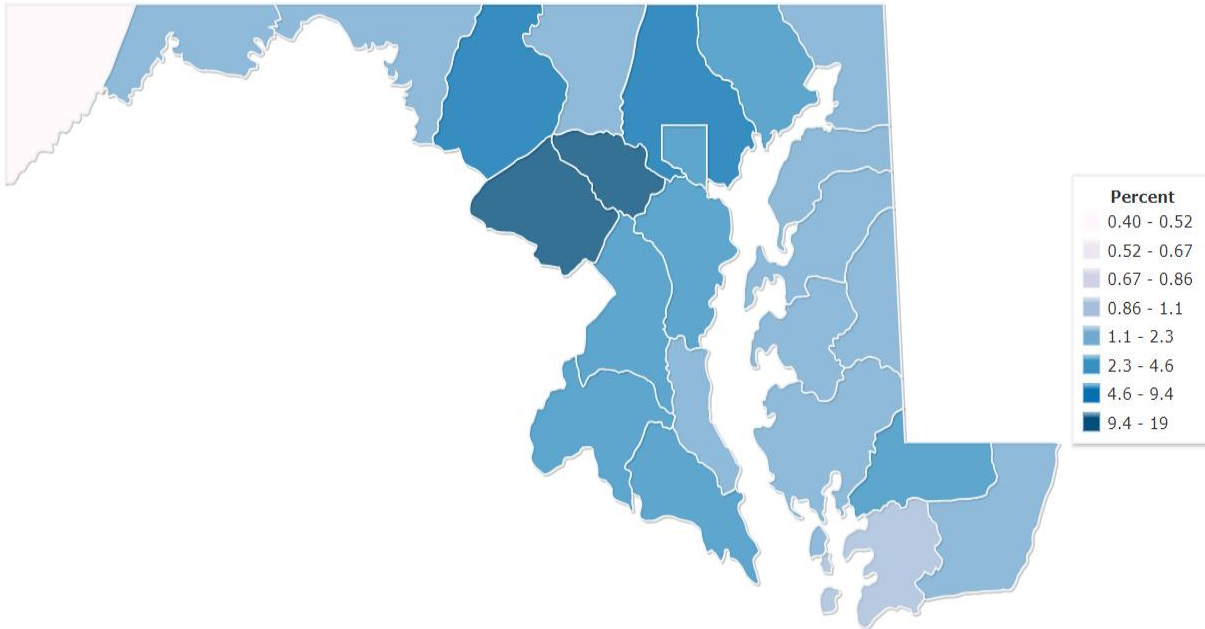

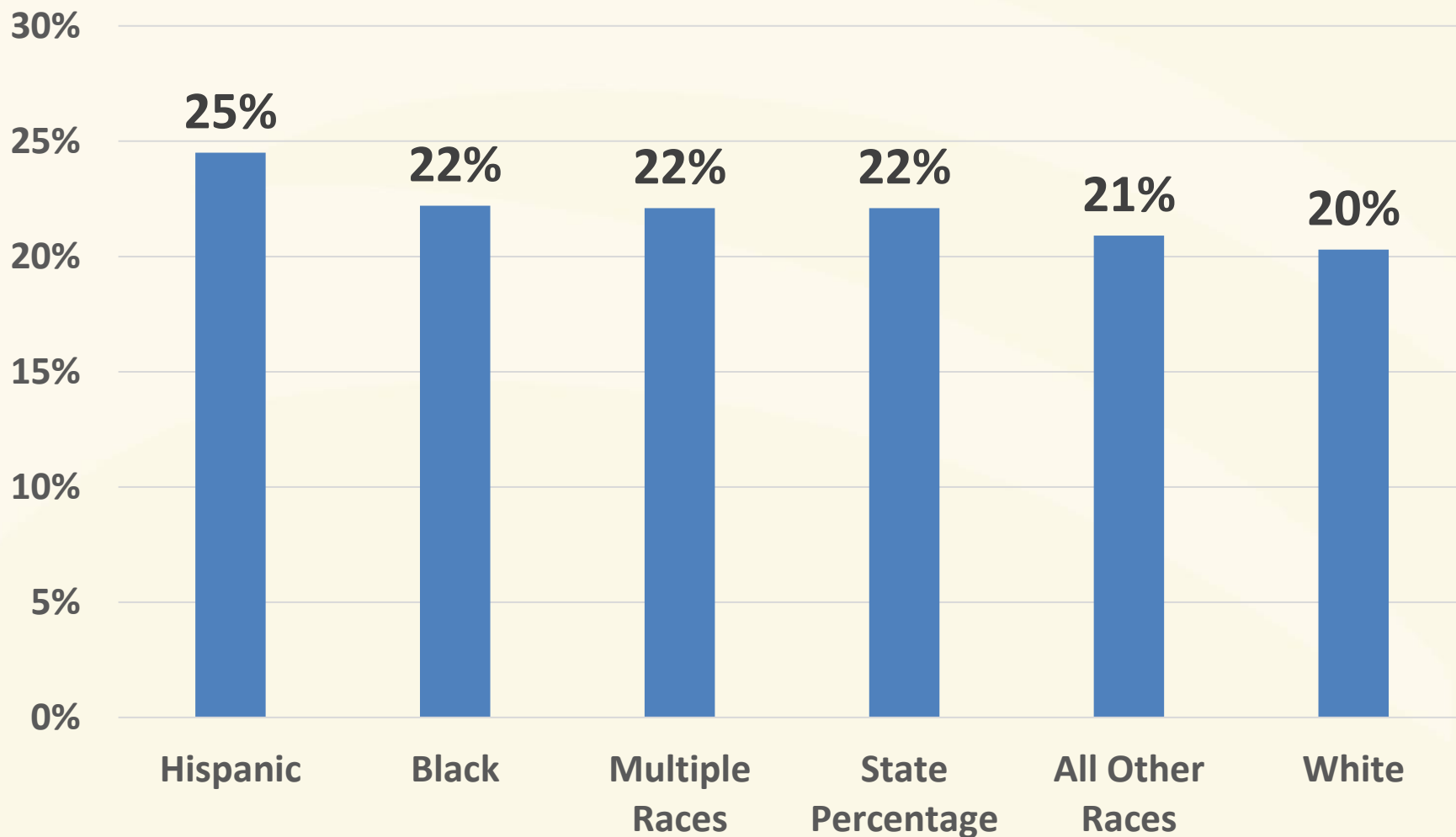

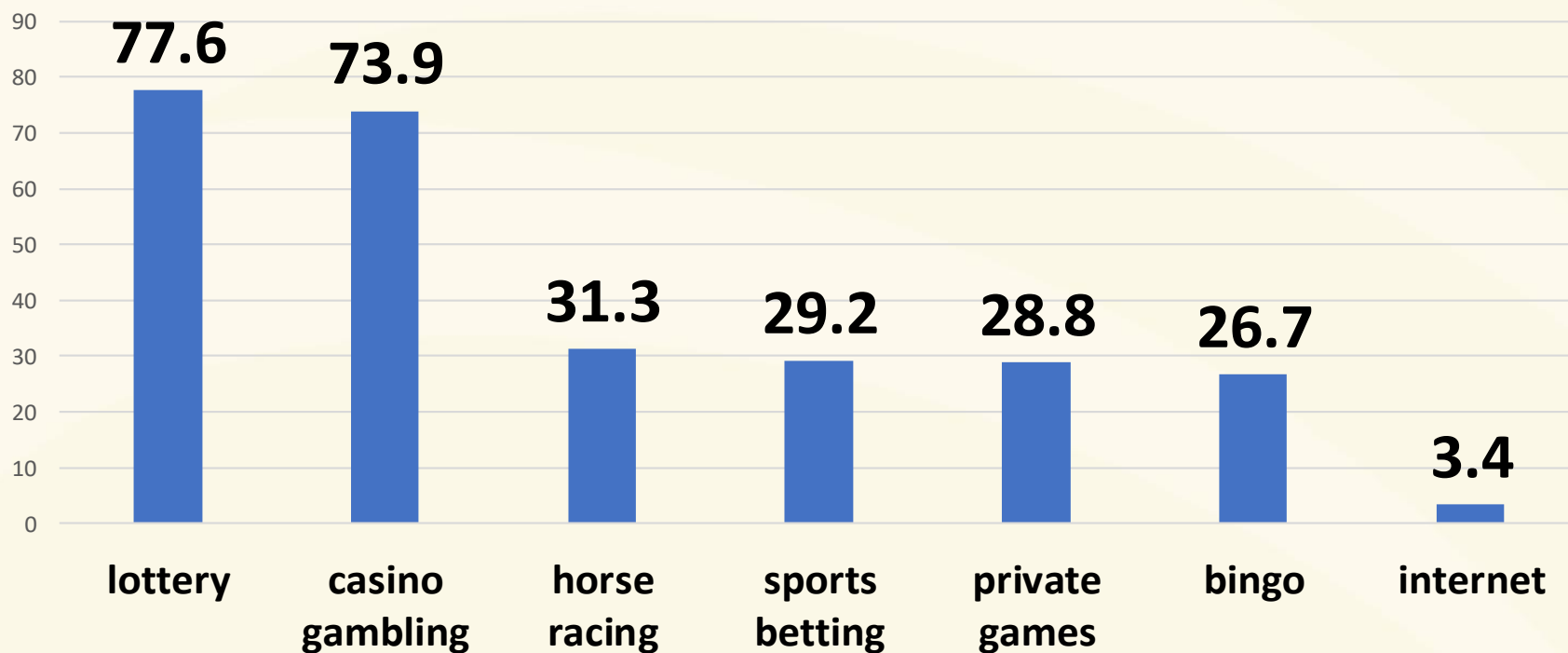

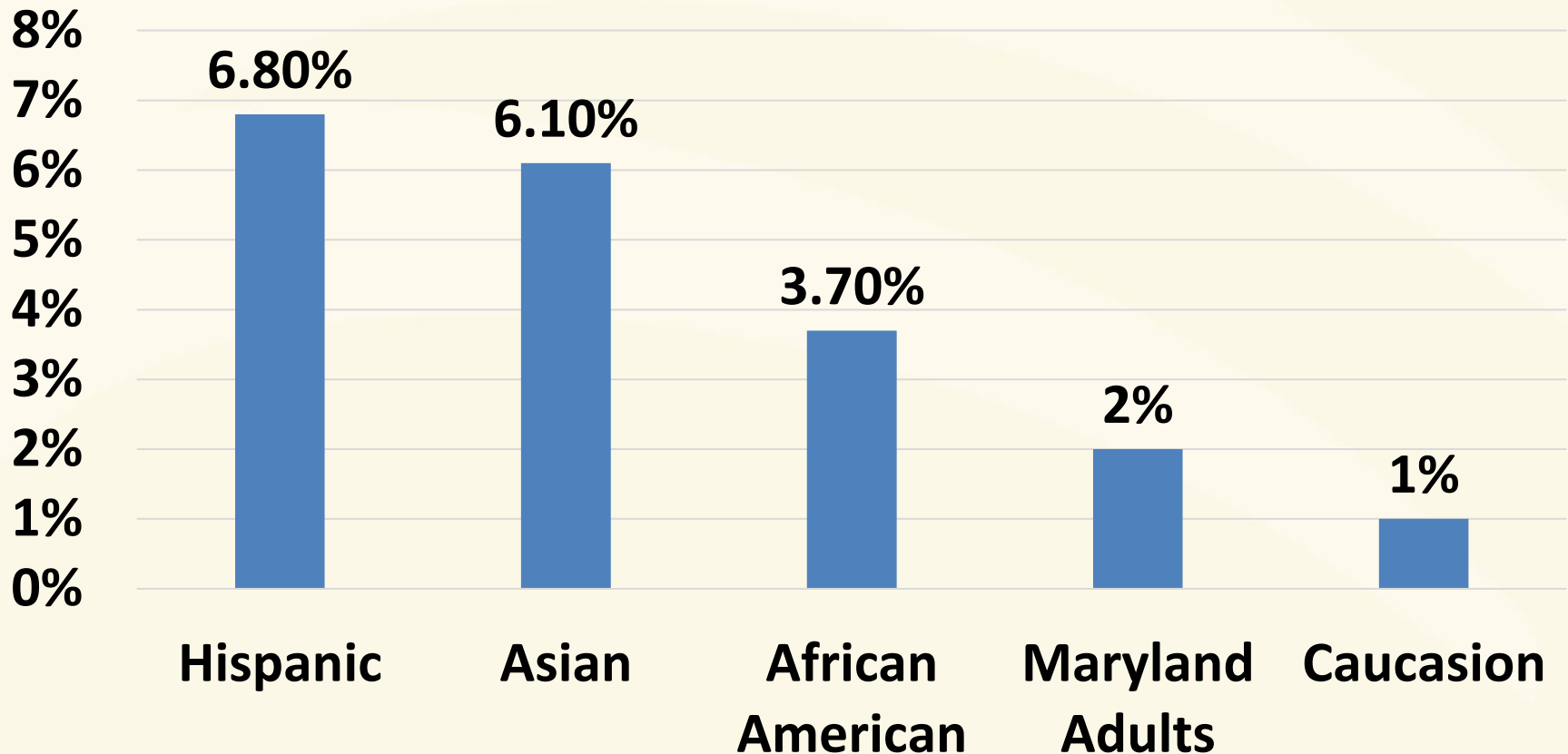
Percentage of Maryland High School Students Reporting Gambling in the Last Year by Race (YRBS, 2018)

Asian College Students and Gambling

- Large study conducted on California college campus (Chan, et al. 2016)
- Found Asian and white students gambled about same amount but Asian students more likely to be problem gamblers
- Asian student less likely to have mental health and other addiction problems compared to whites.
- Asian students more likely to:
 - Claim they won when they lost
 - Gambled more than intended
 - Felt bad about gambling
 - Hide gambling behaviors

Asian CARES Research Report Sept 2021: Massachusetts Gaming Commission (Chinese)

- Some believe it is a quick and easy way to earn money
- Gamble due to cultural loss due to immigration (boredom, no activities in own language) so go to casino.
- Social isolation- gamble due to loneliness
- Gambling is social activity- go with friends
- Gambling to relieve stress (work pressure)
- Gambling to escape reality (distraction from real life)

Asian CARES Research Report Sept 2021: Massachusetts Gaming Commission (Chinese)

Negative impacts they see:

- Financial stress
- Deteriorating family life
- Domestic violence
- Damage trust
- Damage parent/child relationship
- Child neglect
- Seniors gamble because lack of places to have fun, decreased mobility, and family responsibility (no intergenerational households)

Asian CARES Research Report Sept 2021: Massachusetts Gaming Commission (Chinese)

Impacts on mental health:

- Gambler, family, or both deteriorate
- Death due to suicide
- Challenge: problem gambling not discussed

Types of gambling:

Casino 78%

Lottery 43%

Mahjong 35% (tile-based game originating in China in 19th Century)

Sports Betting 30%

* On-line gambling not popular

- Horseshoe Casino: Asian restaurant, Lion dances for Lunar New Year celebration

- Provide buses from Asian communities to the casino
- VIP treatment
- Incentives
- Ads
- Employees speak Asian languages

Underage and Problem Gambling Prevention Strategies and Resources for Help for the Asian Population

Asian College Students and Gambling (Chan, et. al, 2016)

- Primary prevention decreasing perceived benefits of gambling
- Suggest alternative activities for fun and thrills
- Safe gambling strategies taught to those that are legal age or already gambling

Asian CARES Research Report Sept 2021: Massachusetts Gaming Commission (Chinese)

- Grants to Asian organizations to prevent problem gambling
- Invest in neighborhoods where immigrants live
- Provide English classes
