



Risk Factors for Hispanic Youth

Cultural and socioeconomic factors

Traditional games often involve betting elements Familyism and machismo. Gambling seen as potential financial solution

Acculturation


Process of adapting to a new culture can lead to addictive behaviors





Hispanic Heritage Month Facts

- Hispanic Heritage Month is a month-long celebration of Hispanic and Latino history and culture.
- Runs from September 15 to October 15.
- Originally started as a week in 1968 under Lyndon B. Johnson.
- Later expanded to encompass a whole month in 1988 by President Ronald Raegan.
- Multiple Hispanic countries celebrate their independence on September 15.
 - Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua
- 62.6 million! The Hispanic population of the United States as of July 1, 2021, per the Census.
- 18.9% of the total population.
- People of Mexican origin make up nearly 60% of the nation's Hispanic population as of 2021-2023
 Census data.



Hispanic/Latino/Latinx/Latine What does it mean?

• Hispanic:

from or connected with Spanish-speaking countries, especially those in Latin America, or having parents or grandparents from these countries.

Latino:

a person with ancestry from Latin America, regardless of what language they speak. The word is a shortened form of the Spanish term *latinoamericano* ("Latin American")

• Latinx:

a gender-neutral or non-binary alternative to the Spanish-language words Latino and Latina, which traditionally refer to people of Latin American descent.


The term was created to promote inclusivity for those who do not identify as male or female.

• Latine:

Latine is a gender-neutral term for people of Latin American heritage, a Spanish-language alternative to Latino/Latina/Latinx and is more easily pronounceable for Spanish speakers. The term uses the Spanish letter 'e' to replace the gendered 'o' and 'a' endings, mirroring existing non-gendered words in Spanish, like "estudiante" (student)



DID YOU KNOW?



Zoe Saldaña, who is of Puerto Rican and Dominican heritage, is the only actor in history to have starred in four films that have grossed over *\$2 billion* worldwide: Avatar (2009), Avengers: Infinity War (2018), Avengers: Endgame (2019), and Avatar: The Way of Water (2022).

With her appearances in these blockbuster franchises, her films have collectively grossed over \$14 billion, making her one of the highest-grossing actresses of all time.



Hispanic/Latino Contributions



Guillermo González Camarena:

Invented an early color television transmission system which helped bring color TV to Mexico! A simplified version of his system was even used by NASA in 1979 to capture and transmit color images from space!



Olga D. González-Sanabria:

highest-ranking Hispanic at the NASA Glenn Research Center. She also contributed to the development of nickel-hydrogen battery technologies which is most notably used to power the International Space Station (ISS).



Luis von Ahn:

a Guatemalan American entrepreneur and computer scientist, co-founded Duolingo and co-invented CAPTCHA.



My Hispanic/Latino Experience and Gambling

- The Lottery was and still is very popular in Puerto Rico.
- Cockfighting, Horse Racing, Casinos, and other forms
- of gambling are present on the island.
- Cockfighting is part of the culture in Puerto Rico and persists regardless of the federal ban.
- "El Premio Mayor", was a massively successful telenovela produced in Mexico about a working-class man who won the national lottery. This show aired in the mid 90s.
- Sports wagering is legal in Mexico and Puerto Rico.
- Soccer is the most popular sport in Mexico.
- Baseball is the most popular sport in Puerto Rico.





2024 Prevalence Study

Key Findings:

Hispanic/Latino adults have **similar or slightly higher rates** of gambling participation compared to the general population.

Higher rates of problem gambling observed among Hispanic/Latino individuals in several studies.

Cultural acceptance of gambling (e.g., family traditions, social gatherings, lottery) can normalize behavior early in life.

Barriers to treatment include language, stigma, and lack of culturally relevant resources.

Many individuals may **not identify as having a gambling problem**, even when behaviors are concerning.

Important Takeaway:

→ Hispanic/Latino communities are not at higher risk because of culture — but cultural and social factors can influence how gambling is perceived, experienced, and addressed.

MD Voluntary Self-Exclusion

What It Is:

 A voluntary self-exclusion program allowing individuals to ban themselves from certain gambling activities in Maryland.

Ways to Self-Exclude:

- In person at one of the 6 casinos
- By appointment with at MLCGA Headquarters at 1800 Washington, Blvd., Baltimore, MD 21230

Exclusion Categories:

- Casinos
- Lottery
- Instant Bingo Halls (10+ machines)
- Fantasy Sports
- Sports Wagering

Exclusion Length Options:

- Minimum 2 years
- Lifetime option available

Important Notes:

- Removal is not automatic requires counseling session or recovery meetings
- Trespass citations and forfeiture of non-cash gaming funds apply if breached
- Confiscated funds are transferred to Maryland Problem Gambling Fund

Self-Exclusion is a serious commitment — our goal is to make the process supportive, accessible, and compassionate.

Language Line

Purpose:

Provides real-time interpretation for individuals who don't speak English.

Why It Matters:

- Removes language barriers for those seeking help.
- Expands access to self-exclusion and responsible gaming resources.
- Available to MLGCA staff and Casino Compliance Representatives statewide.

Languages Supported:

Over 240 languages, including Spanish, Korean, Mandarin, and more.

Recent Use Example:

Assisted a Korean-speaking individual during a self-exclusion process.
